

While in our charge the publication of such a paper is both novel and experimental, we know that in congregations and charges of other localities such sheets have been productive of much good, and that neither paster nor people would be without them.

We think that such a paper should be of especial service in charges like ours, where the labors of one pastor are diffused among so many members, scattered over no less than 125 square miles of territory, and where personal contact of pastor with members must therefore be limited, and pastoral visits must be very few.





This meeting was well attended and very profitable, impressing every one there with the fact that the work of the church is not failing but prospering, and that a great missionary zeal is arousing our church which should permeate everyi faithful member.

THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY.

SPRING SESSION.

Having accepted the invitation of the First Evan. Luth. Church of Selinsgrove, in the pastoral charge of the President, Conference convened in that church May 3-5, 1892. As the Secretary of Conference, your Pastor had the honor of preaching the opening sermon. The attendance was exceptionally good, 20 clerical members and 8 lay delegates being present, notwithstanding the fact that two parishes are now vacant. Your delegate, Mr. Jonathan Bonawitz was also there.

The business transactions of most general interest were the reports of the two committees appointed at the previous meeting. The committee on the re-arrangement of congregations into parishes reported at great length, covering the whole territory of Conference and making recommendations in regard to every parish in our bounds. This report was fully discussed and then adopted. In regard to Lykens Valley Charge the recommendation is that it be constituted as it is, "but looking to a division as soon as possible."

The Fall Meeting of Conference will be held in Salem's Church at Elizabethville. beginning on Tuesday, Sept. 27, 1892.

SYNOD.

The one hundred and forty-fifth annual convention of the Ministerium of Pennsylvania, known as the "Mother Synod," was held in Trinity Lutheran Church, Reading, Pa., of which Rev. J. Fry, D. D. has been the honored pastor for more than 25 years. Synod was opened with confessional services and the Holy Communion, Thursday morning, June 9, 1892, and was brought to a close late on Tuesday evening following. This was the 15th convention of Synod held in Reading, the 1st one having convened Oct. 24, 1770.



The Orphans' Home.

After presenting illustrations of our Theological Seminary and Muhlenberg College in former numbers, we are glad to be able to present this year, a picture of another of our Church Institutions, altogether too little known, -our Orphans' Home and Asylum for the Aged, located at Germantown, not far from our Theological Seminary.

Widows and orphans are particularly commended to the Christian consideration of the church, and in this institution our church is taking care of many who are needy, both of the young and the aged, of her household of faith. Rev. Geo. Ph. Mueller, the German Secretary of Synod, has for a number of years been the efficient Superintendent of this Home. Including the Superintendent's family and the teachers, this large family consists of about 100 mouths to be fed, so many pair of feet to be shod and so many bodies to be clad. This was done last year at an expense of \$8854.16. The whole support of the Home comes from our congregations and their charitably inclined members. Some bring large gifts, others small; some send money, others provisions. Anything can be used which is useful in smaller private families.

St. John's congregation last Christmas, on very short notice, made up a donation in money and goods amounting in value to \$24. If our members in the several congregations are willing to respond, the opportunity will gladly be offered again. If the Lord shall spare us and our children to enjoy another Christmas Festivity, shall we then remember the fatherless?

SYNOD.

The Ministerium of Pennsylvania has developed and grown from year to year until its clerical members now number fully 300. Its size indeed is such as to be the cause of inconvenience and the object of concern. While heretofore the congregations of our centres of Lutheranism have entertained Synod by turns, the strain because of the size of the body in late years has become greater than they are willing and able to bear. Hence the resolution of Synod at its special meeting in January, 1893:

Funeral Notes.

In times of affliction and prostration with grief, families often are so overwhelmed as hardly to know what course to take without timely counsel. A few suggestions will not be out of place here, on those funeral arrangements in which the church is directly involved.

- 1. Among the very first arrangements to be made after death, along with the sending of word to the undertaker, consultation should be had with the officiating minister. The rule is indeed that precedence be given funerals, but previous engagements of a similar or of a different character may have been made, which can not be broken. Never send out word until engagement is made with the pastor.
- 2. Sunday funerals should be avoided under all ordinary circumstances, except they can be performed along with a regular appointment. The time of pastors is thoroughly occupied on Sundays, and to pointments be set aside and congregations be disappointed, sometimes even where God's Word is preached only once every month. This is no injustice to the pastor, but it is not right to the congregation. It is far better that a few persons go to slight inconvenience than that a whole congregation be prevented from worship.
- 3. If a particular Scriptural text is to deceased or the family, propriety requires that this be made known to the pastor self-selected texts are not always appropriate, yet ministers cheerfully accommoinformation be given; otherwise it is an preach acceptably from them.

- 5. All persons involved in the direction of funerals should co-operate in the fulfillment of the appointment as to time. Of course to the sorrowing family it is a matter of small importance whether the funeral procession start from the house a half hour earlier or later, but for the hundreds of persons who may be waiting, many of whom have gone to inconvenience and self-denial to travel long distances to make the appointment, and considering the educating effect on the public. the sum total of discomfort and harm of late funerals is very considerable. To wait for friends who are late is very uncertain. With this number The Parish Record bids its readers adieu, in the anticipation of a speedy dissolution, with the Parish which it has so faithfully strived to serve. Let us hope that it, "being dead, yet speaketh."

The Reunions of the Catechumens of five years, held last September were very interesting and impressive occasions. While many could not attend, we gladly noted that some went to inconvenience to do so. Still others had no desire to be present. The average per cent. of attendance was almost 60. In numbers, St. John's 50; Simeon's, 35; Salem's, 16; Zion's, 16; St. Jacob's, 9; total, 126.

wonday, January 14, 1895, 9:30 a. m. the joint Church Councils will meet in annual session in Salem's church at Elizabethville. The St. John's Council is requested to meet with them in order to settle up the accounts to date.

MISSION FESTIVAL.

August 4, 1894, was the time of the third annual mission festival of our people. We were again visited by representative men of our church, who come to us but rarely. They were this time Rev. G. Ph. Mueller, Superintendent of our Orphans' Home at Germantown, and Rev. Wm. Ashmead Schaeffer, English Home Missionary Superintendent of our Synod, also of Germantown, who spoke to the great profit and edification of the people. Besides the pastor, Revs. W. F. Bond of Tower City, W. H. Dale of Williamstown and J. N. Wetzler of Uniontown were also in attendance and delivered short addresses. the co-operation of the several congregations, the speakers, the bands of music and the weather, are largely due the very pleasant recollections of the day.

CHARGE DIVISION.

Paul and Barnabas were both noble men and servants of God, yet at one time they were at variance to such an extent that they could no longer travel together, but must part, Acts 15:39. We therefore need not to be greatly surprised to see history repeat itself in the church militant. The division of our charge is an illustration.

variance. misunderstandings had crept in amongst us, and it was painfully evident that the congregations could not prosper A joint meeting of the Councils was called, Nov. 10, '94, for the purpose of making a final effort to attain to a mutual better understanding of one another, or to "follow after the things that make for peace," Rom. 14: 19. More favorable action being rendered imposaible by the failure of the one side to represent itself, the following action was reluctantly taken:

RESOLUTIONS.

Whereas the Lykens Valley Charge is too laborious to be served acceptably by one pastor, and Conference has recommended a division "as soon as possible", and

Whereas the congregations confess their ability to support two pastors, and

Whereas there has of late been wanting between the congregations that spirit of harmony and co-operation so necessary in christian work, therefore.

RESOLVED, First: That the Lykens Valley Charge be dissolved, and that Simeon's, Salem's, Zion's and St. Jacob's congregations hereafter constitute one Parish.

RESOLVED, Second: That this division go into effect Jan. 1, 1895, subject to the approval of Conference.

RESOLVED, Third: That the trustees of the five congregations be charged with the duty of advertising the parsonage property, and selling the same to the highest bidder, at public sale, as soon as possible, distribution to be made in proportion to the shares held by the several congregations, at once after payment is made, and possession to be given Apr. 1, 1895.

Organization of the new Charge was deferred until Dec. 3rd, in the hope that after all there might be a change of sentiment by that time. But on that day the four congregations received and accepted the pastor's resignation, organized themselves under the name of the former Charge, viz. The Lykens Valley Charge. With Mr. John H. Bonawitz in the chair, Mr. Isaac Swab was elected Secretary, and Mr. John Snyder, Treasurer. The preaching appointments in each of tne congregations were fixed, the pastor's salary decided on and apportioned to the congregations, and steps were taken towards securing a pastor.

Thus ends the last chapter of the history of the Lykens Valley Charge as it was constituted for many years. There is a peculiar sense of regret and pain with all who are involved, but partings often bring pain. Let all differences now be eternally buried in oblivion let us be brothers indeed, and pray that the Great Head of the church may overrule what seems evil now for ultimate good.

RESIGNATION.

In order that the action of the Joint Councils could be carried out,

your pastor tendered his resignation Dec. 3, going into effect Jan. 1, 1895. The fact that circumstances required it, did not obviate the pang of separation any more than the necessity of application of the surgeon's knife allays the pain. The pastoral relation is a very tender one, and when it is mutually as cordial as it should be, a separation must bring with it regrets and heart-aches.

The faithful pastor stands by his flock in joy and sorrow. He enters the homes at happy family reunions as well as at the ringing of the Marriage Bells, and surrounds the festal board with them. He likewise visits them in sickness, offers prayers from their bedsides, and speaks comfort at the bier and the grave. He introduces the little lambs into the covenant of grace by Holy Bartism, and after instructing them. receives them in solemn Confirmation by laying on of hands and the extending of the right hand of fellowship. He dispenses from Sunday to Sunday the bread of life and the Holy Sacrament.

The burdens of his holy calling are sweetened and lightened by words of appreciation, and yet more by deeds of kindness and gifts of love. This largely has been the happy relation between us and the members of these five congregations whom we have tried to serve with faithfulness to the Master for the past five years and one-half. This is the relation that is now to be severed. But true love never dies, and although the relation of pastor must be severed with many of you, our love need not grow cold. As true children of God, we continue forever one in the Lord, and it is our prayer that our common Lord may raise up other pastors to mir.ister to all his people according to his own good pleasure.

Statistics are of more than trivial or temporary interest, hence at the close of this pastorate we desire to record the following facts. The pastorate continued for a period of five and a half years, and during it your pastor brought 295 infants to Christ in Holy Baptism, after instruction in the Word of God and the doctrines of our Evangelical Lutheren Church, he received by Adult Baptism and the Rite of Confirmation 211 young persons into communion with our congregations, comforted the bereaved at 151 funerals, solemnized 69 weddings, preached 807 sermons, besides numerous addresses, dispensed the Holy Supper to 5984 guests, made 1458 visits to the aged, sick and others, and in order to meet all these appointments traveled by private conveyance upwards of 11135 miles.
