With this number The Parish Record bids its readers adieu, in the anticipation of a speedy dissolution, with the Parish which it has so faithfully strived to serve. Let us hope that it, "being dead, yet speaketh."

The Reunions of the Catechumens of five years, held last September were very interesting and impressive occasions. While many could not attend, we gladly noted that some went to inconvenience to do so. Still others had no desire to be present. The average per cent. of attendance was almost 60. In numbers, St. John's 50; Simeon's, 35; Salem's, 16; Zion's, 16; St. Jacob's, 9; total, 126.

a. m. the joint Church Councils will meet in annual session in Salem's church at Elizabethville. The St. John's Council is requested to meet with them in order to settle up the accounts to date.

### MISSION FESTIVAL.

August 4, 1894, was the time of the third annual mission festival of our people. We were again visited by representative men of our church, who come to us but rarely. They were this time Rev. G. Ph. Mueller, Superintendent of our Orphans' Home at Germantown, and Rev. Wm. Ashmead Schaeffer, English Home Missionary Superintendent of our Synod, also of Germantown, who spoke to the great profit and edification of the people. Besides the pastor, Revs. W. F. Bond of Tower City, W. H. Dale of Williamstown and J. N. Wetzler of Uniontown were also in attendance and delivered short addresses. the co-operation of the several congregations, the speakers, the bands of music and the weather, are largely due the very pleasant recollections of the day.

#### CHARGE DIVISION.

Paul and Barnabas were both noble men and servants of God, yet at one time they were at variance to such an extent that they could no longer travel together, but must part, Acts 15:39. We therefore need not to be greatly surprised to see history repeat itself in the church militant. The division of our charge is an illustration.

variance. misunderstandings had crept in amongst us, and it was painfully evident that the congregations could not prosper A joint meeting of the Councils was called, Nov. 10, '94, for the purpose of making a final effort to attain to a mutual better understanding of one another, or to "follow after the things that make for peace," Rom. 14: 19. More favorable action being rendered imposaible by the failure of the one side to represent itself, the following action was reluctantly taken:

#### RESOLUTIONS.

Whereas the Lykens Valley Charge is too laborious to be served acceptably by one pastor, and Conference has recommended a division "as soon as possible", and

Whereas the congregations confess their ability to support two pastors, and

Whereas there has of late been wanting between the congregations that spirit of harmony and co-operation so necessary in christian work, therefore,

RESOLVED, First: That the Lykens Valley Charge be dissolved, and that Simeon's, Salem's, Zion's and St. Jacob's congregations hereafter constitute one Parish.

RESOLVED, Second: That this division go into effect Jan. 1, 1895, subject to the approval of Conference.

RESOLVED, Third: That the trustees of the five congregations be charged with the duty of advertising the parsonage property, and selling the same to the highest bidder, at public sale, as soon as possible, distribution to be made in proportion to the shares held by the several congregations, at once after payment is made, and possession to be given Apr. 1, 1895.

Organization of the new Charge was deferred until Dec. 3rd, in the hope that after all there might be a change of sentiment by that time. But on that day the four congregations received and accepted the pastor's resignation, organized themselves under the name of the former Charge, viz. The Lykens Valley Charge. With Mr. John H. Bonawitz in the chair, Mr. Isaac Swab was elected Secretary, and Mr. John Snyder, Treasurer. The preaching appointments in each of tne congregations were fixed, the pastor's salary decided on and apportioned to the congregations, and steps were taken towards securing a pastor.

Thus ends the last chapter of the history of the Lykens Valley Charge as it was constituted for many years. There is a peculiar sense of regret and pain with all who are involved, but partings often bring pain. Let all differences now be eternally buried in oblivion let us be brothers indeed, and pray that the Great Head of the church may overrule what seems evil now for ultimate good.

### RESIGNATION.

In order that the action of the Joint Councils could be carried out,

your pastor tendered his resignation Dec. 3, going into effect Jan. 1, 1895. The fact that circumstances required it, did not obviate the pang of separation any more than the necessity of application of the surgeon's knife allays the pain. The pastoral relation is a very tender one, and when it is mutually as cordial as it should be, a separation must bring with it regrets and heart-aches.

The faithful pastor stands by his flock in joy and sorrow. He enters the homes at happy family reunions as well as at the ringing of the Marriage Bells, and surrounds the festal board with them. He likewise visits them in sickness, offers prayers from their bedsides, and speaks comfort at the bier and the grave. He introduces the little lambs into the covenant of grace by Holy Baptism, and after instructing them. receives them in solemn Confirmation by laying on of hands and the extending of the right hand of fellowship. He dispenses from Sunday to Sunday the bread of life and the Holy Sacrament.

The burdens of his holy calling are sweetened and lightened by words of appreciation, and yet more by deeds of kindness and gifts of love. This largely has been the happy relation between us and the members of these five congregations whom we have tried to serve with faithfulness to the Master for the past five years and one-half. This is the relation that is now to be severed. But true love never dies, and although the relation of pastor must be severed with many of you, our love need not grow cold. As true children of God, we continue forever one in the Lord, and it is our prayer that our common Lord may raise up other pastors to mir.ister to all his people according to his own good pleasure.

### SUMMARIES.

Statistics are of more than trivial or temporary interest, hence at the close of this pastorate we desire to record the following facts. The pastorate continued for a period of five and a half years, and during it your pastor brought 295 infants to Christ in Holy Baptism, after instruction in the Word of God and the doctrines of our Evangelical Lutheren Church, he received by Adult Baptism and the Rite of Confirmation 211 young persons into communion with our congregations, comforted the bereaved at 151 funerals, solemnized 69 weddings, preached 807 sermons, besides numerous addresses, dispensed the Holy Supper to 5984 guests, made 1458 visits to the aged, sick and others, and in order to meet all these appointments traveled by private conveyance upwards of 11135 miles.
